

Making EU aquaculture more sustainable and competitive



Why do we need the AAM?

Aquaculture is one of the fastest-growing food-producing sectors worldwide. For the EU, the huge potential of aquaculture production in terms of the supply of sustainable and nutritious food and social and economic development remains untapped. There exists a unique opportunity to expand aquaculture production in the EU. Around 70 % of the aquatic food (fisheries and aquaculture products) consumed in the EU are imported.

Sustainable aquaculture development will allow the EU to increase its own supply of aquatic food products, making it more competitive and less reliant on imports from non-EU countries. The 'strategic guidelines for a more sustainable and competitive EU aquaculture for

the period 2021-2030' provide a **vision and concrete recommendations for actions** to make this happen. One important aspect of implementing this vision is to increase knowledge on issues relevant for sustainable aquaculture development among EU Member States, aquaculture producers and other stakeholders.

To ensure successful implementation of the strategic guidelines, the AAM provides technical, logistical and administrative support to the European Commission. In addition, the AAM is responsible for the EU Aquaculture website that aims to be a one-stop stop for disseminating and exchanging relevant knowledge among EU institutions, EU Member States, the aquaculture industry and other stakeholders.

The AAM will also provide trainings on the guidance documents developed by the Commission.




